# Language Change

Fiona: You know how in America and the UK they use different terms for

certain things?

Garret: Like in the UK they say "biscuit" but in the US they say "cookie".

Fiona: Exactly. Well, I found out that sometimes new words from America

slowly enter the British vocabulary despite the fact that British people

are often initially reluctant to use them.

Garret: Such as?

Fiona: "Awesome" and "movie". People in the UK never used to use these

words. They were thought to be "Americanisms".

Garret: Do all American words move to the UK?

Fiona: I don't think so. For example, in the US "jelly" is something you put

on your bread, whereas in the UK it's something children often eat with ice cream. British people put "jam" on their bread, not "jelly".

Garret: Interesting. I've found something about words like "policeman" and

"mankind".

Fiona: Are they new words?

Garret: Well, no. They're old words and they both use the word "man" to

mean "all people" – including women. Nowadays, many people are averse to it and say it is unfair to women and it is inappropriate. They suggest we use alternatives, such as "police officer" or "police person"

for "policeman" and "humankind" or "people" for "mankind".

Fiona: I see. Do people use the new suggestions?

Garret: I think so. I think the trouble is people agreeing on which word they

should actually use.

Fiona: Let's talk to Mr Hall about our ideas to see if they are fine.

Garret: Good idea.

Narrator: Now listen to the recording again.
